Longtime Fairview coach Mayberry dies

Funeral services will be today for Ray Mayberry, the first football and basketball coach at Fairview High School and a member of the faculty there for 40 years.

Mr. Mayberry, 88, died Saturday. Services will be at the Baker-Hazel Funeral Home, 5555 Philadelphia Drive.

Mr. Mayberry came to Dayton in 1928 when Fairview opened. He

is best remembered for his 19 seasons of football. He retired from coaching after the 1946 season but remained on the faculty until his retirement in 1968.

He coached basketball six seasons and won a Montgomery County championship in 1931 before the school was incorporated into the Dayton school system.

George Henry ZIMMERMAN

ZIMMERMAN, George Henry age 91 of Kettering, passed away on January 1, 2014 at Bethany Village. George was the second son of David Henry and Dorothy Albright Zimmerman, born in Philadelphia, PA on October 25, 1922. His brother, David Albright Zimmerman, also predeceased him. The Zimmerman family moved to Flushing, Long Island where George attended elementary school at PSD 32 and Bayside High School. George received his BA in 1947 with a major in philosophy and a minor in religion and his MA in 1951 from Miami University after service in the 242nd Infantry, 42nd Infantry Rainbow Division. On completion of his military service George also studied at the Ohio State University, Harvard and the University of Washington. George served for twenty-five years as a mentor and teacher. He began as a vocal elementary teacher and then as a Supervisor of Music for the Dayton Public Schools from 1953-1978. He went on to teach Music education and served as a lecturer in American Music at the University of Dayton until retirement in 1994. He continued his adjunct teaching during the summers at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, WA. George committed much of his life to his passion for music, writing and producing. George spoke at the International Society of Music Education conference in Interlochen, Michigan in 1966 on "Music Education in the United States". Among his many published articles are two edited collections of folk songs, "Start with a Song" and "Reflections" (Cooperative Recreation Service, Delaware, OH.) He also wrote "Seasons in Song", a collection of original childrens songs for the holidays (Tamms-Wilmark.) George will be remembered for all the young lives he mentored and influenced throughout his career. George was the creator and host of two weekly television series held at WLW-D in Dayton, OH, "Passport to Music" for eight years and "By George," two thirteen week series, produced at Wright State University for WLW-D. This series received the Television Academy of Arts and Science Emmy in June of 1973. George was Director of the Dayton Liederkrantz-Turner German Mens Chorus for 12 years and served his college fraternity, Pi Kappa Alpha, as National Music Director for fifteen years. He produced elementary school shows and state musicals from 1954-1978 and produced many stage operettas. When George moved to Florida in 1996, he created a lecture series for the Naples Philharmonic Center for the Arts. He presented ten lectures each year for six years for the popular series, "Our American Music Heritage." George wrote the cookbook, "Everything Makes Me Think of Food," published by Micro press in Bellevue, KY. This book was an expansion of his annual Christmas card to friends that contained his favorite recipes. He published a second edition of this cookbook while living in Florida, and it featured local favorites from the Naples area. George returned to Dayton in 2006 and took up residence at Bethany Village. He never gave up his writing and wrote stories in the Bethany monthly "Homesteader" from 2006-2009. Teacher's lessons live on in students

Her classroom was Room 101, at the end of the hall. When you entered it for the first time — as a high school sophomore or junior — you knew you were about to embark on a special journey.

Dorothy Herbst was a special teacher.

Those who passed through Fairview High School in the '30s, '40s, '50s or '60s were changed by the time they left Room 101.

The subjects listed on our report cards were English or Dramatics or Humanities, but we learned so much more. We learned how to read and understand a book; how to stand on our feet and share our ideas; how to write a term paper that was original, not a rehash of books listed on a bibliography.

"A classic is a classic because it has universal utility — not because some teacher puts it on a reading list and calls it a classic," Miss Herbst once told a reporter.

When she especially liked something you'd written, she'd put a big exclamation point next to it. In my basement are a few papers bearing her scrawled "A." An "A" from Dorothy Herbst was something to be proud of, cherished.

She was tall and extremely thin. She lived with her sister, who taught piano, in a contemporary glass-and-redwood house on Honey Hill Lane, built when they fell in

love with the view from the hill in Harrison Twp.

Miss Herbst spoke and gestured theatrically and loved to talk about former students who had become successful.

When we were seniors, she took us on a train to New York and exposed us to drama, music, dance and architecture. She took us to the Museum of Modern Art and Sardi's. And she introduced us to

some of those former students.

In those days, Bob Van Scoyk wrote scripts for *The Doctors*, *The Nurses*, *The Defenders*. Barry Frank directed ABC Sports. Dick Joseph was travel editor for *Esquire*. Jim Trittipio designed sets for *Hollywood Palace*. Wes Kenney directed for ABC; Morton da Costa directed Broadway plays.

"If they can do it," Miss Herbst subtly let us understand, "you can too."

We always complained about the workload. The papers were longer than any we'd ever been asked to write before.

Those who took her humanities class were required to study one subject for 60 to 100 hours, then teach it to other students at a seminar. "You don't know anything until you can teach it," she would say.

Years later, when we encountered tough professors in college classrooms, we blessed her for pre-

paring us for harder times.

Miss Herbst said adolescents were escapist rather than in themselves. The problem, she told others, was to get them to accept and understand themselves instead of running away.

"Know thyself" was her favorite saying. She said it summed up the reason for education.

When students walked into Room 101 on that first day, she always began by pointing to three imaginary balloons floating near the ceiling.

There were words on them, she told us: "Who am I?" "What am I?" "Where am I going?"

By the time we were ready to leave Miss Herbst and Room 101, we had begun to formulate the answers to those questions.

Dorothy Herbst died Jan. 27 at her residence on Honey Hill Lane. She taught at Fairview High School from 1932-1971. She was a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University, and earned a double master's degree from Northwestern University. A recipient of a Ford Foundation grant, she was one of the first to develop advanced placement classes in the city.
