It is amazing what has been accomplished in the past four months. By the first of November things should be in apple-pie order."

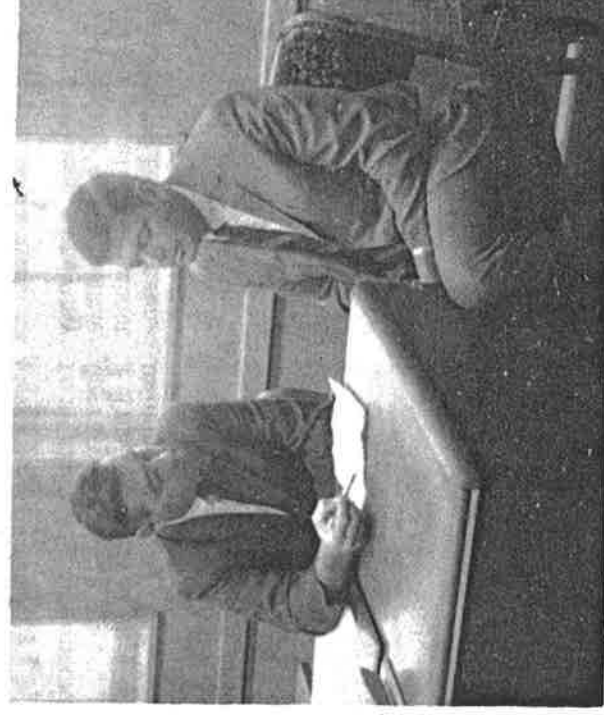
In 1952, Mr. Feuer came to Fairview. He taught biology and general science for five years, was a full-time counselor for four years and assistant principal for five years.

When asked to explain the difference in duties between assistant principal and principal, he replied, "Actually, there is very little difference. A principal

has more contact with the teachers and the operation of the school itself. The assistant principal does a great majority of the mechanical functions of the schools operation."

"It's a pleasure to have someone to work with who is both enjoyable and interested in the same goals for the school." Mr. Feuer is, of course, referring to Mr. Ronald Bradley, Fairview's new assistant principal.

Mr. Bradley has been at Fairview for the past ten

years. He taught Driver's Education for one year, Physical Education for one year, Typing for six years, and was active counselor for two years. Mr. Bradley was also head coach for both track and football for six years.

When asked about the difference between coaching and being assistant principal, he commented, "Being a coach and assistant principal are similar because of the time involved and enjoyment received. But it was a chance to move forward in administration

—something I have always wanted to do."

The situation of the building has not made Mr. Bradley's job any easier. "The condition of the building at present hasn't hurt us, but it has hindered the students and scheduling. It has also caused confusion among the freshmen due to the fact of no freshman reception, which acquaints the new students to the building.

Some of the ninth grade English classes this year are being taught by Mrs. Jean Merman, one of the new teachers on Fairview's faculty. Mrs. Merman taught English for the last three years and especially likes working with freshmen.

Between working on her Master's degree at Miami University and teaching here at Fairview, she spends her free time cooking, sewing, and listening to classical music.

Mr. Niday received his Bachelor's degree from Ohio University, and he is a graduate of Marshall University where he obtained his Master's degree.

Mr. Niday is quoted as saying: "It will be my objective to assist students in getting the best possible education while at Fairview high school, and to provide students with information that will help them to make sound decisions regarding their future."

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Cross Country Team Awaits Coming Season

Coach John Maxwell, after last season's second place finish, is eagerly awaiting the start of the 1967 season. He believes that Fairview's Cross Country team in 1967 has the potential to win the city title.

Says Coach Maxwell, "We will open our season with the Fairmont East Invitational meet. Last year we came home with the runner-up trophy, and this year we expect to win." The second major meet will be the Miami University Invitational at Oxford, Ohio. Fairview was a surprising tenth last year, and is expected to be a strong contender in 1967.

Next, the trip to Ashland College will give the team a chance to find out just how tough they really are, as they go against strong contenders from Northern Ohio. Last year, out of 38 teams, Fairview finished 18th, and again in '67 Coach Maxwell's boys expect to do even better. Six returning varsity runners (including four lettermen) and a fine crop of sophomores should provide Fairview with a good nucleus this season.

Dave Sassenger, who holds the school record (at 10:02) heads the list of returning veterans. Doug Cutler, Lance James, and John Keeny, outstanding as sophomores, should improve this year, giving some outstanding performances. Craig Scherer rounds out the list of veterans. Juniors John Brown, Dave Wheeler, and Tim Daiker, should make a strong bid for a position on the varsity squad. Sophomores Don Beavers, Bob Berry, Don Carmichael,

Terry Dever, Chris Deener, Dave Engle, and transfer student Peter Busch, should be in contention for a spot on the team.

Last month Tom won the men's championships at Meadowbrook Country Club.


