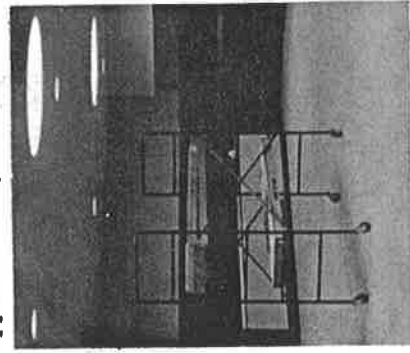
New Gym Nears Opening

When the Fairview Bulldogs start their basketball season, chances are they will be playing many of their games in the new gymnasium.

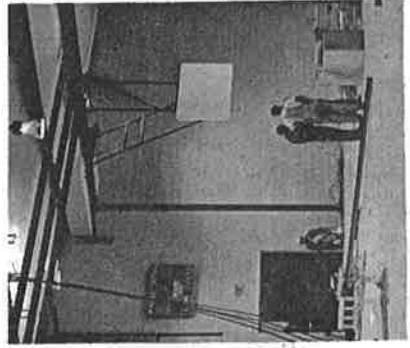
Authorities report that the gym, which will seat approximately 1600, should

be opened before the first of December.

The new gymnasium, which will have the most modern athletic facilities of any high school in Dayton has a basketball court covering 88 ft. The scoreboards from the old gymnasium are being used.

Adelphi will hold a paper drive November 11, to earn money for their annual May Dance. The entire school can participate by bringing papers and magazines.

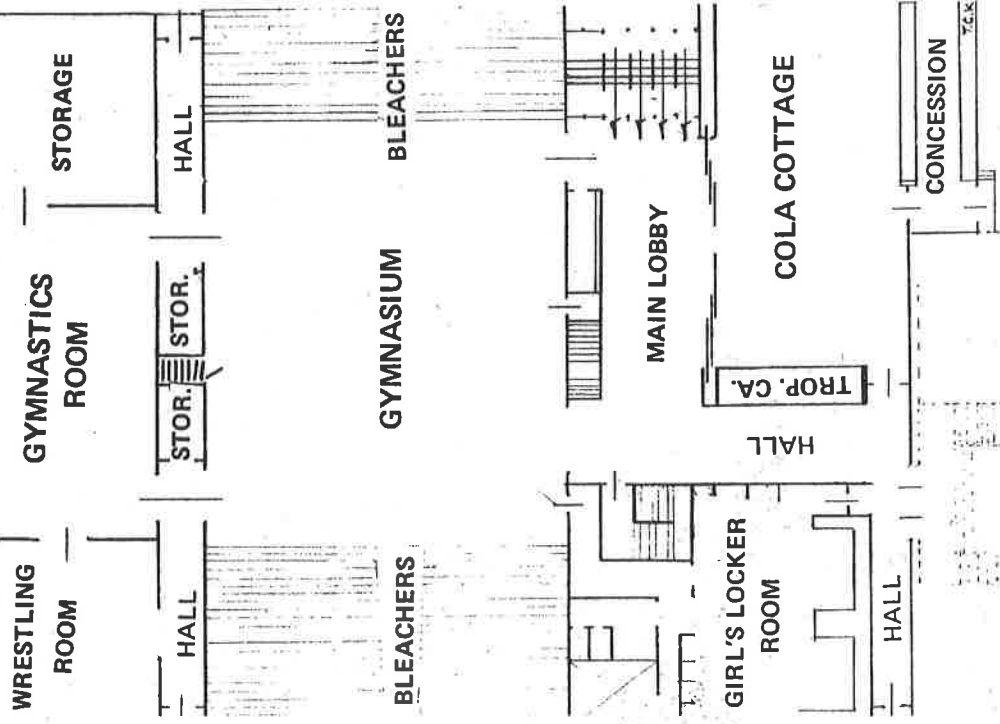

The sophomore class has been having a pen sale to increase their savings. The pens are blue and gold and have this year's basketball schedule printed on it.

Connie Bouts and Jim Manion have been chosen semi-finalists in the A.F.S. Foreign Exchange Program. Connie is the first senior chosen from FHS. They will find out the results in March.

The wrestling team will have its own training room which connects with the main gymnasium, and the gymnastics team will have its own practice room located directly off the gym. Miss Cole and the girls' gym classes will occupy new facilities adjacent to the gymnasium. The girls' locker room will contain 89 lockers and 12 showers to accommodate their gym classes. Miss Cole's office is located in the middle of the locker room and is bounded by glass panels. Mr. Winters and the boys' gym classes will use facilities on the lower level and adjacent to the team locker rooms. Mr. Winter's office is located beside the boys' locker room and is bordered by glass panels.

The team locker room is also located on the lower level. It contains 120 lockers which will be used by our teams during their playing season. The Cola Cottage is located on one side by a glass trophy case 10 feet long which serves as a wall, the new refreshment area will be in service for games played at Fairview.

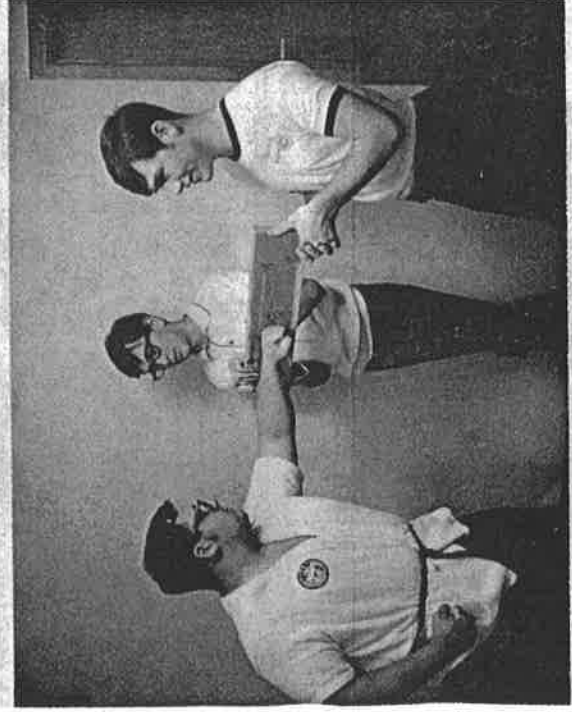

What Do You Call Steve Friedberg? — Sir!

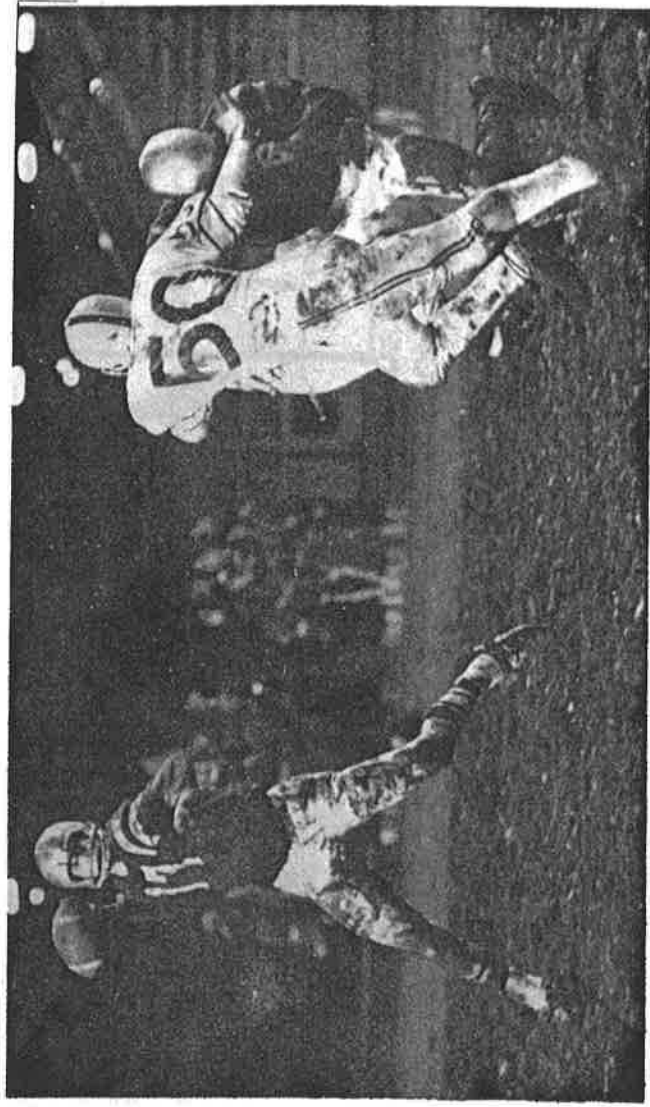

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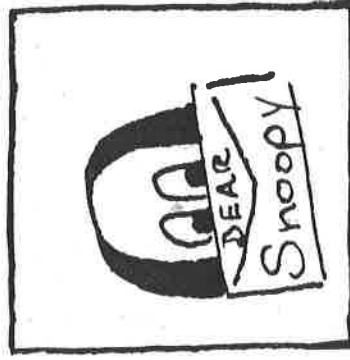
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Dear Snoopy,

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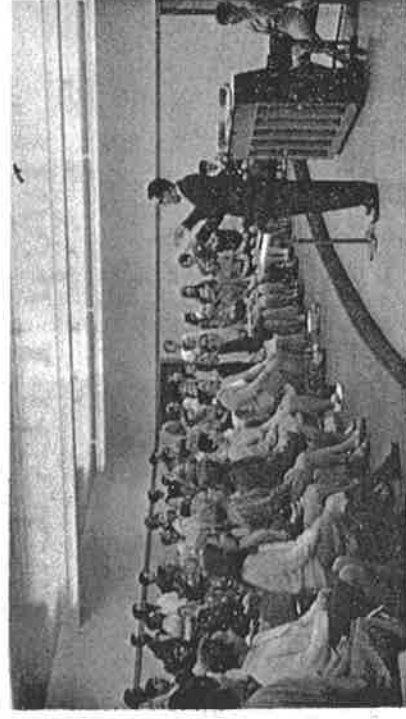

Chamber Choir President, Van Jones, also has the duty of directing the group. The secretary is Shelia Stanifer, and the librarian is BeeDee Friedman.

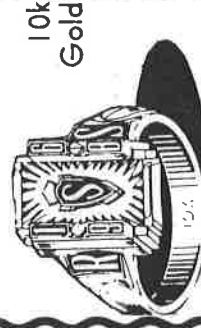
