Fairview Has School Plant-In'

In the middle of November students of Fairview participated in a city-wide program sponsored by the City-Beautification Council. One thousand tulip bulbs, which were purchased by the Dayton Power and Light Company, were distributed to Fairview.

A landscape expert, Mr. Elmer Van Horn, from Siebenthalers, was consulted as to where the bulbs should be placed. Mr. Van Horn recommended that the bulbs be planted along the area

on top of the new wall, located on Hillcrest Ave. He also suggested to plant the bulbs among the evergreens on the corner of Philadelphia and Hillcrest Avenues.

Biology Club, along with the help of Student Council, planted the bulbs under the faculty direction of Mr. Joseph Kaenzig and Mr. Avery Allen.

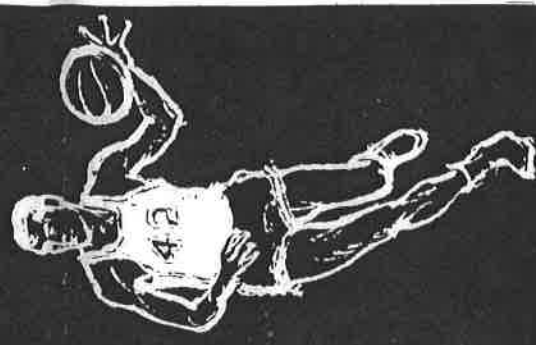
Credo Material

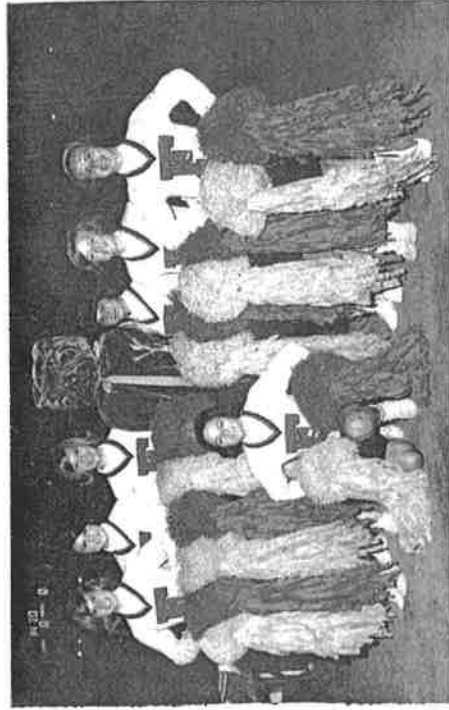

Some of you may wonder who is the tall guy behind the bulldog. That's Dan Beatty, our mascot. He has a lot of spirit and shows it at all of the games.

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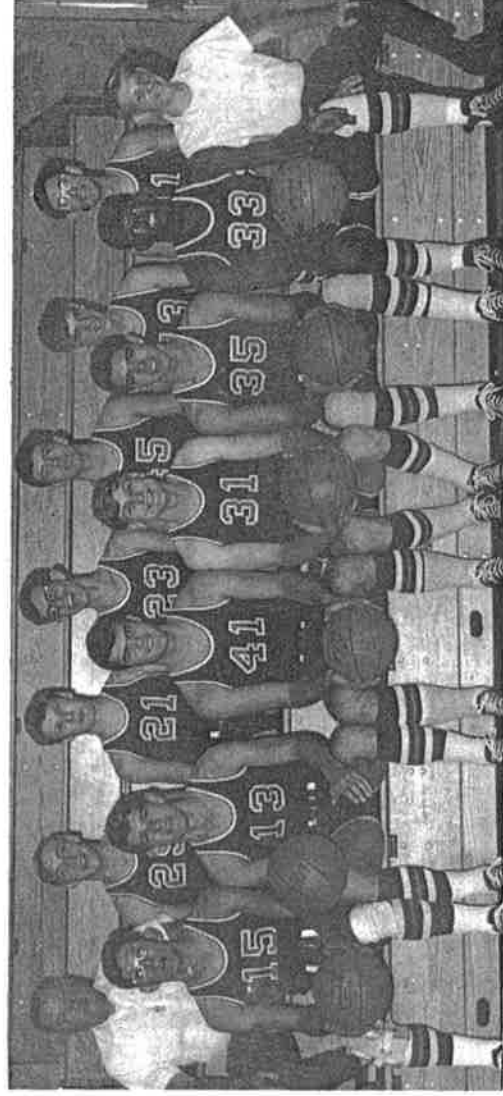
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Bulldogs Open Against Eagles Tonight

Mr. Jonathan Davis, Fairview's World History student-teacher, began his early schooling in Harlem, New York, and is a graduate of Lawrence High School, in Lawrence, New York. He is now a senior at Central State University where he is majoring in geography as well as World History.

Mr. Davis recalls his childhood as being long and sweet, yet dull and very influential upon his life now. "I lived in the slum or ghetto section of Harlem. There I saw things that kids my age shouldn't have seen, such as the distribution of narcotics, fighting and prostitution. You didn't have to leave your block to see these things. You were confronted with them every day."

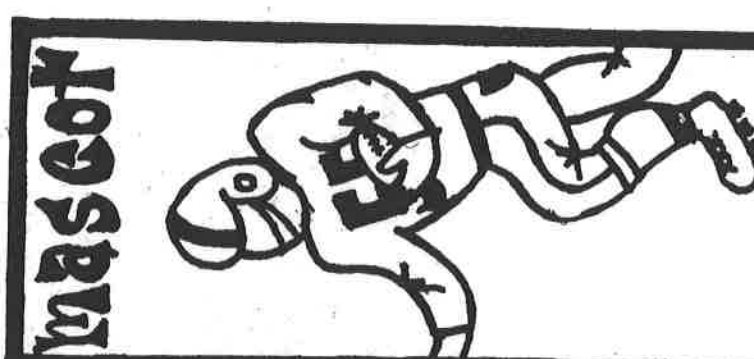
Mr. Davis is personally concerned with this situation in which he lived, and has some very definite ideas as to a possible solution to the problem of educating slum children. "I feel that there should be a complete change in the educational system. There should be either a national system or national creditation, at least on a basic average."

Mr. Davis plans to return to New York and teach there before going to graduate school. "I want to teach in a ghetto school, for I am looking at myself about six years ago. I understand some of the problems and I feel that I can help them."
