## Fairview Inaugurates New Plastics Course

The Industrial Arts Department at Fairview has added this year a two-semester course in Plastics. According to Mr. Lloyd Stooksberry, co-ordinator of the department, the course is designed to give the boys some knowledge of plastics and the processes and techniques of working with plastic.

"The addition was brought about by two things: an increasing demand for more Industrial Arts courses and an increasing use of plastics in industry," remarked Mr. Stooksberry.

The boys pay for their own materials and make projects. They start by shaping flat plastic or sheet into letter openers, coasters, pen and pencil set bases, and trays. Students then begin to play interesting."

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## Seriously Speaking

On July 1, 1867, Queen Victoria signed the British North America Act, giving Canada dominion status. Compared to our Revolution, this was a slow and peaceful means of separation.

The American culture is one born of the idealistic and stormy eighteenth century. Our original settlers deliberately severed their ties with Europe, the established church, and with the feudal past. Out of their pioneering spirit grew the philosophy of rugged individualism of our nation.

Canada, on the other hand, was settled first by the French, who came to spread Roman Catholicism. Later the Tories came up from the United States, because they wished to remain a part of Britain. The Scots, who came to Canada in the last century, were stalwart imperialists.

Canada has never had to "go it" on her own. In her infancy, she relied on Britain, and even today Canada is greatly influenced by Britain. Canadian culture and history have been the culture and history of Western Europe.

How has this background left Canada to cope with the twentieth century? Unlike Americans, Canadians have no instinctive fears of strong central government. Instead they have grown up believing it to be a necessary ingredient for democracy. The Canadian government is therefore permitted to move with much more freedom than ours in Washington, particularly in foreign affairs. Canada was ready to recognize Red China while we were still struggling with the aftermath of the Korean War. Today she is a noted "middle power". Canada certainly detests communism, but she realizes that for practical reasons she can not choose to ignore it.

Canada's strong ties with Britain, which have given her free movement in foreign affairs, certainly have prevented her from becoming a great nation in the past and even now. Yet she may be very well equipped to deal with the problems of the future.

Where is Clyde Clivitch? In attempting to find many people

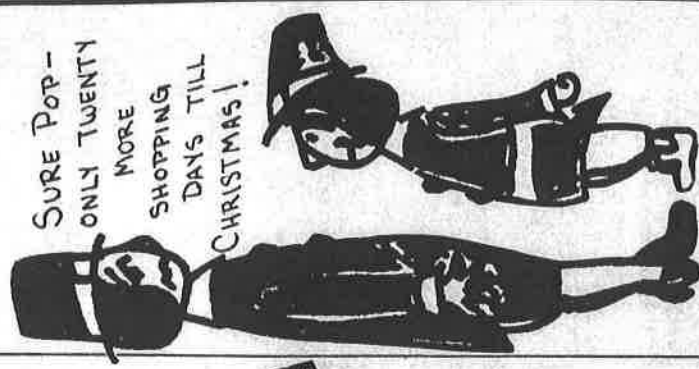
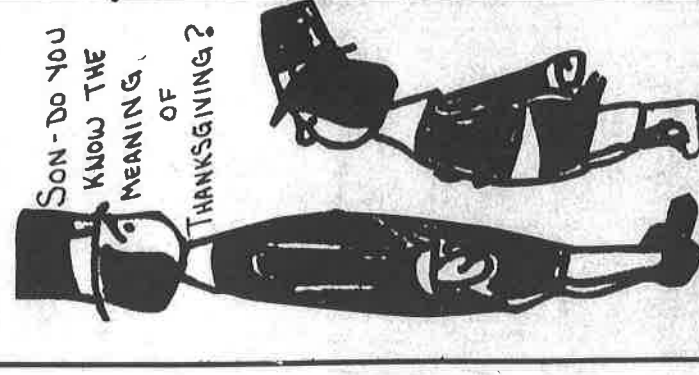

Morning devotions throughout the week emphasized the ideals and accomplishments of the United Nations.

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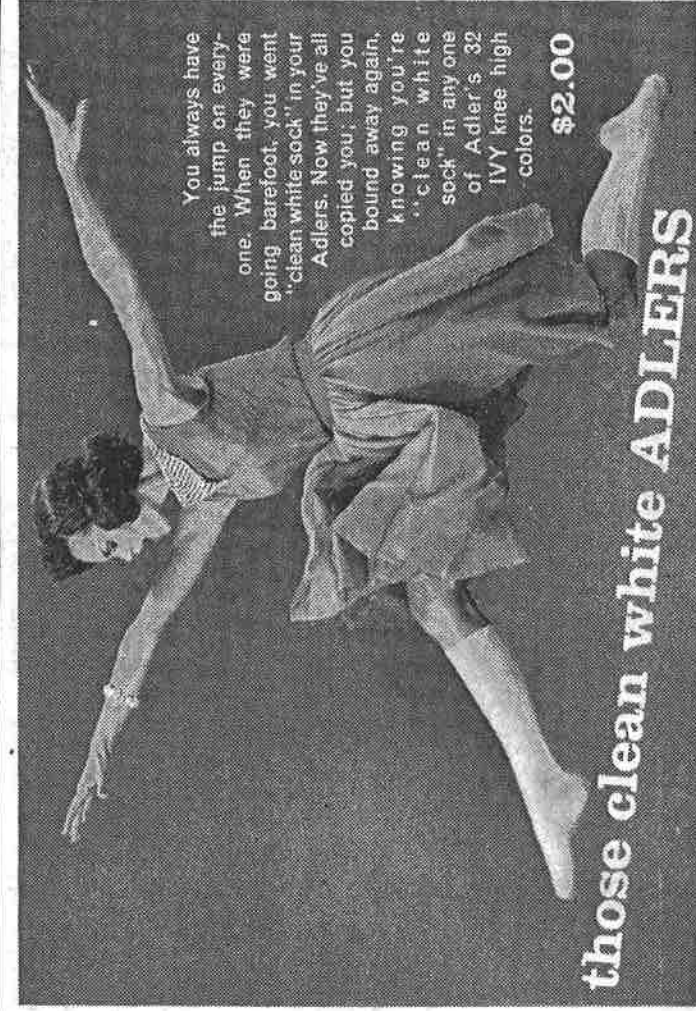
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
