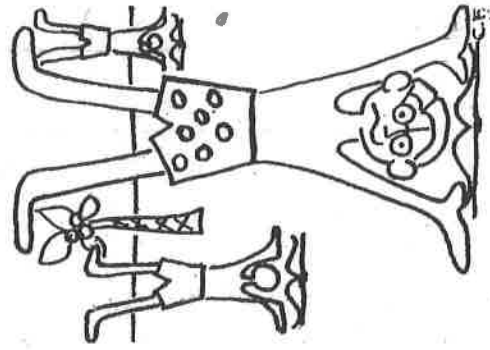
In the science department, several new courses have been added. Botony is one of the newest this year. This is divided into two

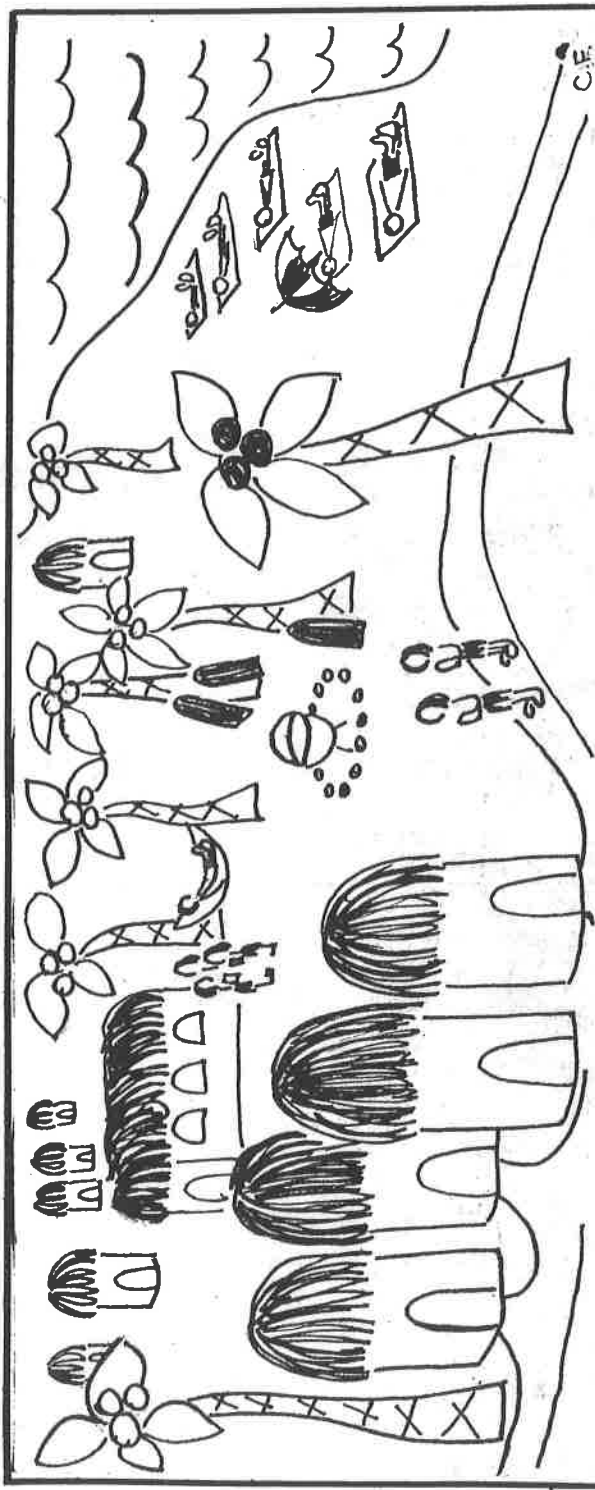

The first bake sale on the island was a huge success. The combined service clubs sold \$200 worth of clam cookies, oyster cake, and coconut clusters.

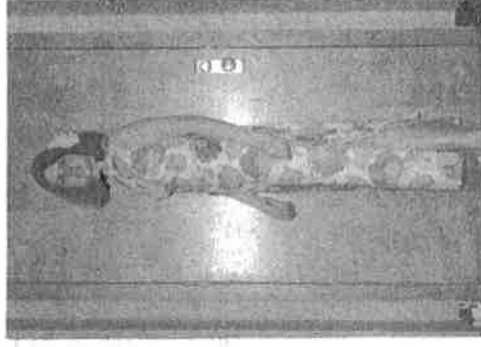
Fashion colors are somewhat different on the island this year. For instance, the new summer colors are sea green and dandelion yellow.

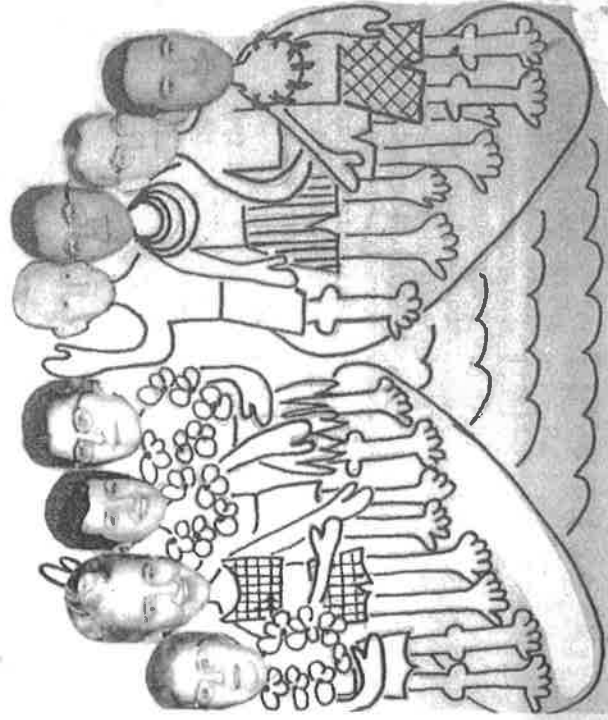

beaches where the boys are seen drilling in "goco-sen-tics" and beach running.

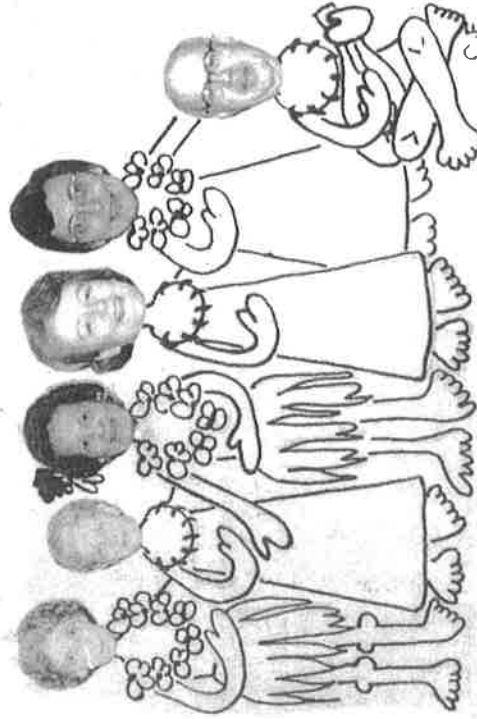

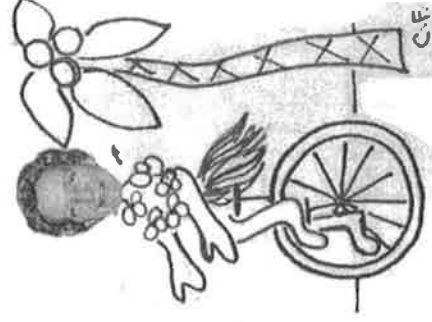

Included in Miss Eck's training program is a free monthly "tune-up". During this, the brakes are checked, air is put in the tire, the seat cover is mended, and worn wheel spokes are replaced. The tire is seldom worn down since the speed limit is 5 m.p.h. The unicycle has its setbacks. It is against the law for more than one person to ride at a time; therefore, when one dates, one must resort to walking.

There are advantages to unicycling. There is a larger area devoted to sports since a very small parking lot is required.
