Sandy Stepp began the exercise the girls call jumping jacks, but it looked more like the "Fred-die", another new jive.

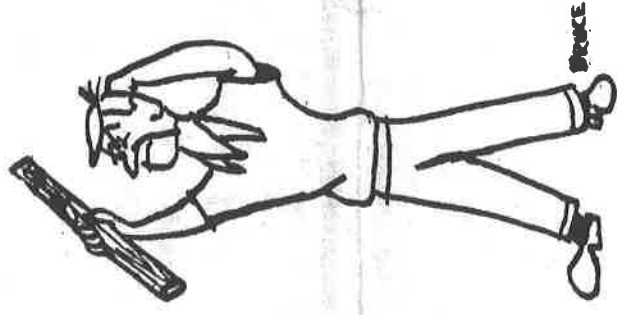

Hoopsters of all sizes filled the Fairview gymnasium on Nov. 1. This was the official opening of basketball practice for varsity and reserve candidates.

Mr. Donald D. Barger starts his thirteenth season as basketball coach at Fairview. Twelve of those thirteen years have been as head coach.

The Fairview team had an overall record of 13 wins, 6 losses last year, and a city record of 7 wins, 3 losses. It finished in a tie for second place with Meadowdale.

The squad has only two returning lettermen—John

Pichler, senior, and Bob McCowan, junior. This is the first time in Coach Barger's career he has had only two returning lettermen. Only two other boys have any varsity experience. These are Ted Devilbiss, senior, and Ron Neff, junior.

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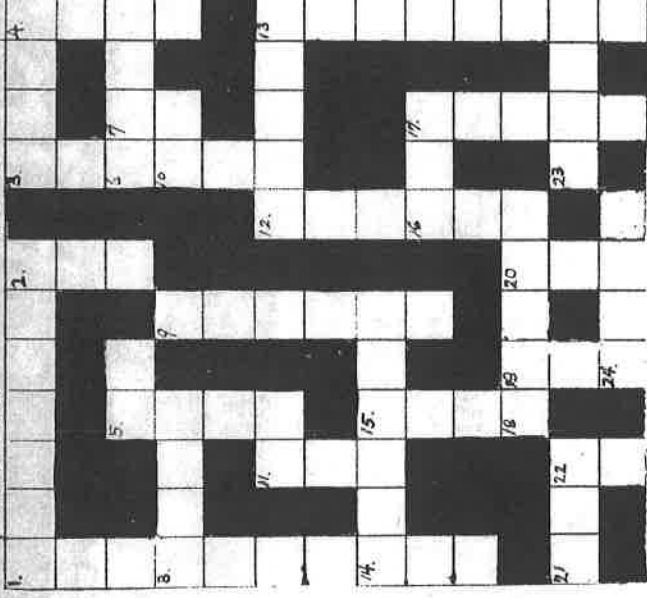

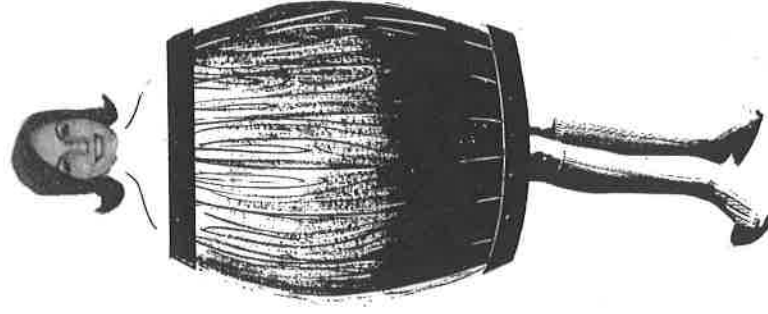
National Honor Society
